You'll learn, for instance, that the Oatfield Crustal Fault is just across our fence line, running through the Windermere neighborhood. And while it isn't capable of generating a "massive" earthquake, still ...it's between here and the liquor store!

The Washington County Hazards Analysis (same link) discusses the hazards that might endanger us and lists them, beginning with "most likely to succeed."

The one at the top of the list, considered most likely to endanger a Washington County resident, is not an earthquake or fire, but a severe winter storm.



Those here in 2008 remember the severity of such a December storm - it generated a Presidential Disaster declaration. Some

pots in the West Hills reported up to 30 inches of snow and drifts piled 6 feet high. Power was out in some areas for days.
